It's Fire Season!

- ***First some good news!***

All Oakland Fire Stations Open Ahead of Wildfire Season for First Time in Decades! [Click here for details](#). Thanks to all of you who wrote letters and sent comments to the Mayor and City Council. They made a difference.

- ***General Fire and Earthquake Preparedness***

Please help to keep our neighborhood safe by making sure your property is compliant. For additional information about how to do that, please check the **Oakland Firesafe Council's excellent [website](#)**. It contains a wealth of information about fire safety and preparedness.

- ***Park Like Your Life Depends on It!***

Did you know that a fire engine needs a road width of 20 FEET** to assure access in an emergency? Our streets are narrow, winding, with many blind curves, so when you're parking be sure to leave room for emergency vehicles. It could be YOUR life at stake. *Need convincing?* [Watch this video](#). **** From CA Fire Code 503.2.1: “Fire apparatus access roads shall have an unobstructed width of not less than 20 feet (6096 mm), exclusive of shoulders, except for approved security gates in accordance with Section 503.6, and an unobstructed vertical clearance of not less than 13 feet 6 inches.”**

Who to call if you need help:

- Call 911 – for urgent medical emergencies, or for incidents or disturbances where violence is occurring or may be possible, when there are weapons involved or if there are crimes in progress. Crimes in progress get top dispatch priority.
 - 911 response can be delayed. Calling Oakland Fire (510-444-1616) or Oakland PD (510-777-3211) emergency numbers can result in faster response.
- Call OPD non-emergency (510) 777-3333 in cases that require police assistance but do not involve the emergencies listed above.
- Call MACRO – 510-44MACRO (510-446-2276) for interventions with individuals who appear to be experiencing a mental health crisis or in need of professional support, e.g., behaving erratically, intoxication, non-violent disturbances, etc.

Vehicle Safety Tips – contributed by an OHA member! Thank you!

Since many of us park our cars on the street or in the driveway, here are a few ways to prevent future car theft and burglary. All of these suggestions cost \$20 or less and are widely available online.

- **Faraday box or pouch:**
Your car is susceptible to theft using a simple technique called “relay theft” which targets your keyless entry system. Since many of us leave our keys on a dresser or hanging near a door close to the street, this procedure is fast and eliminates the need for a thief to break a window or hot-wire your car.
Relay theft requires 2 people (one person near the car and one person on the street side of your house), and a \$25 electronic relay unit that can be purchased on-line. That relay unit captures the signal from your key fob, amplifies it, and sends it to a receiver near the car, which in turn unlocks the car doors and could start the ignition. Bingo, your car is stolen and burglarized in less than a minute. This method is also used to steal gasoline as well. Using a Faraday box or pouch will block key fob signals and thwart relay thieves.
- **Tracking tags to locate your car:**
Hide an Apple Air Tag or Android equivalent (MiTag, Chipolo, Tile, Samsung SmartTag) in your car. They can help you find your car whether it’s stolen or lost in a large parking lot. These tracking devices all use Bluetooth connectivity to work with your Find My Device app. They may require an annual \$5 battery replacement.
- **License plate screws:**
License plates are vulnerable to theft, so switch your traditional screws with security screws. It’s easy. Take a plate screw from your car to a hardware or auto supply store to match the thread design. Security screws have special heads that do not work with standard Flathead or Phillips head screwdrivers so be sure to purchase the specialized screwdriver. This 5 minute changeover will make it less convenient for a thief to steal your license plates.

311 Reports (City of Oakland - Report-a-Problem to OAK311) – **reminder and success story!**

In the last newsletter we mentioned using OAK311 to problems about potholes, illegal dumping and other issues. You will find details [at this link](#).

Here's a success story. The large potholes at 1700 Leimert were filled! But 311 reports were not enough; community engagement also played a role. At the Oakmore Bridge ribbon cutting an OHA Director met Josh Rowan, Director of the Oakland Department of Transportation (DOT). He gave her his card and she contacted him directly about the potholes and a recent accident they caused. Within days the repair was done! We even got a note thanking us for bringing the problem to his attention:

"Thank you for sharing this note. Kenneth Patton and his team do amazing work. They can move pretty quickly once we identify these high risk areas. A typical year now is 50k potholes repaired. I have not found a good way to differentiate between routine maintenance and high risk, and I appreciate you bringing these to our attention."
